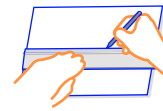




This mobile depicts birds flying in the sky, and cute little fish swimming in the sea. The arm that the string hangs from shows a day scene on one side and a night scene on the other.
Have fun decorating your room with this playful, moving mobile!

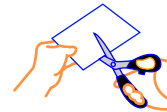
① Folding paper



Before cutting out the parts, use a ruler and exhausted pen (a pen that has run out of ink) to score along the fold lines. Cut the parts out roughly first, then cut carefully along the scissors lines after you have folded them. If you cut them out before folding them it may be difficult to fold the edges neatly.

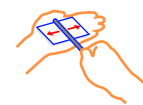
★ Try it in the margin first, to test how hard you should press with the pen.

② Cutting out with scissors



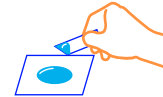
Use the base of the blade when cutting. Take care not to use the entire blade down to the tip, as this makes it more difficult to control the cutting direction.

③ Curving paper



Turn the paper over and place it in the palm of your hand. Apply pressure to the rod and move it left and right to curve the paper.

④ Applying glue



Use some scrap paper to create a pallet and spatula for the glue. This will ensure that you don't use too much glue, and allow for a clean finish.

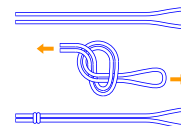
⑤ Gluing paper together



For parts that are glued together, place them between sheets of paper after gluing and then pile something heavy like books on top. This will ensure a neat, flat finish.

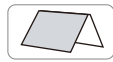
★ Be sure to put it in between scrap paper to keep your things clean from the glue.

⑥ Tying strings

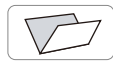


Fold the string in half and align the ends, then make a knot about 1cm from the end.

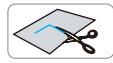
Assembly Instructions



----- Mountain fold (dotted line)
● Make a mountain fold.



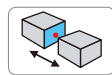
- - - - - Valley fold (dashed and dotted line)
● Make a valley fold.



— Scissors line (solid line)
● Cut along the line.



— Cut in line (solid line)
● Make a cut.



Glue together.

Tools and materials



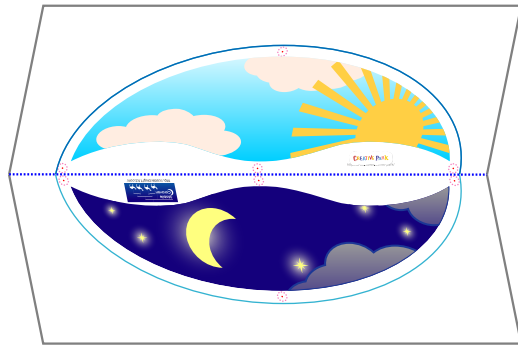
Scissors, a ruler, glue (we recommend woodwork glue), string (any kind of fine, strong thread), an exhausted pen (for scoring along fold lines), a cylindrical rod (for curving parts)

Caution



Glue, scissors, strings and other tools may be dangerous to young children so be sure to keep them out of the reach of young children.

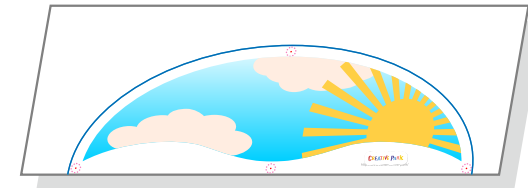
Be careful that sharp corners or scraps of paper do not poke or get in your eyes, etc.



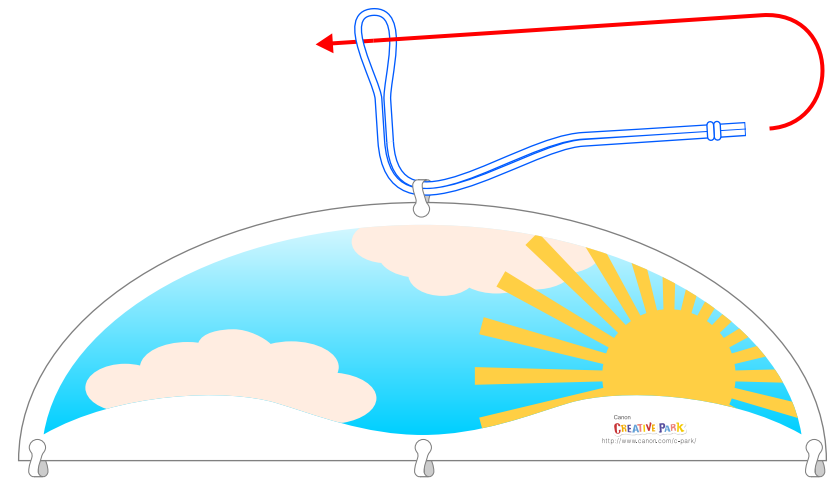
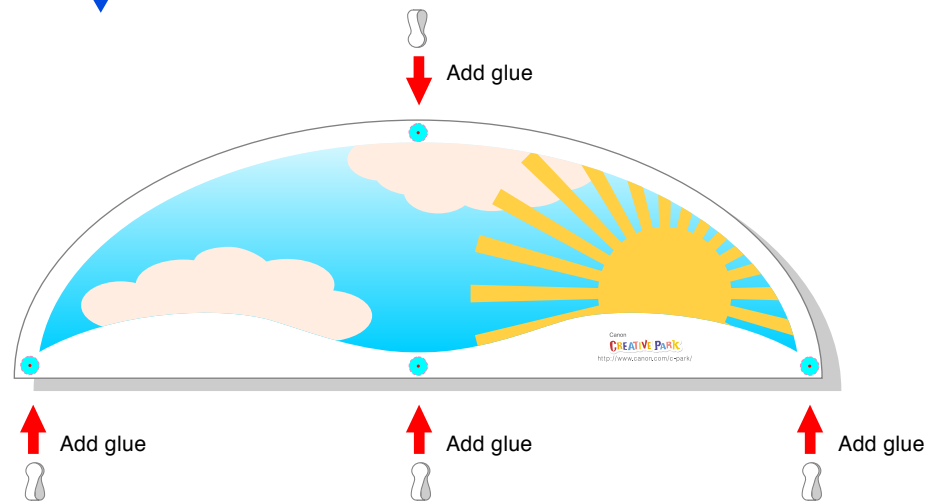
Use a ruler and exhausted pen to score along the fold lines.



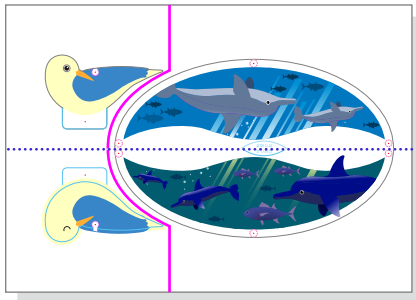
Turn over and put glue on the cyan side.



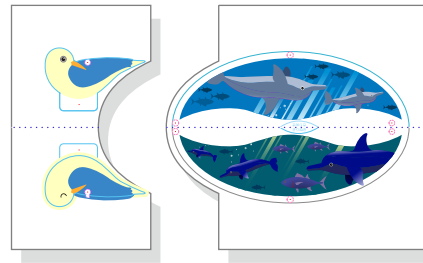
Put in between two sheets of paper, pile something heavy such as books on top and leave to dry for a few hours. Then, cut out the part.



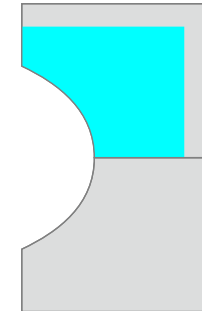
Fold about 60cm of string in half and align the ends, then make a knot about 1cm from the end. Thread the ends through the loop as shown by the arrow.



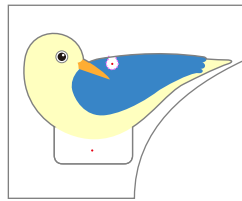
Use a ruler and exhausted pen to score along the center line.



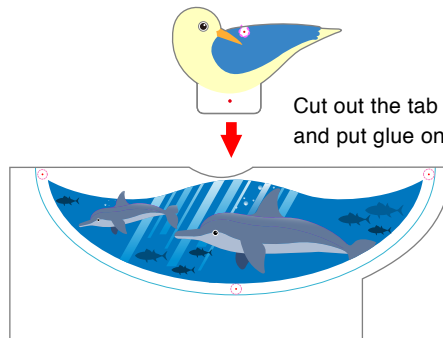
Cut out the water birds and arm parts.



Turn over the water birds and put glue on the cyan area.

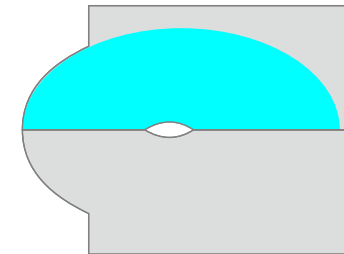


Put in between two sheets of paper, pile something heavy such as books on top and leave to dry for a few hours. Then, cut out the part.

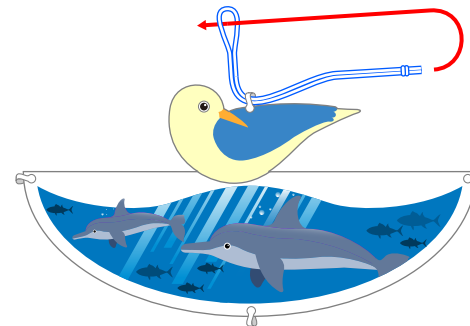
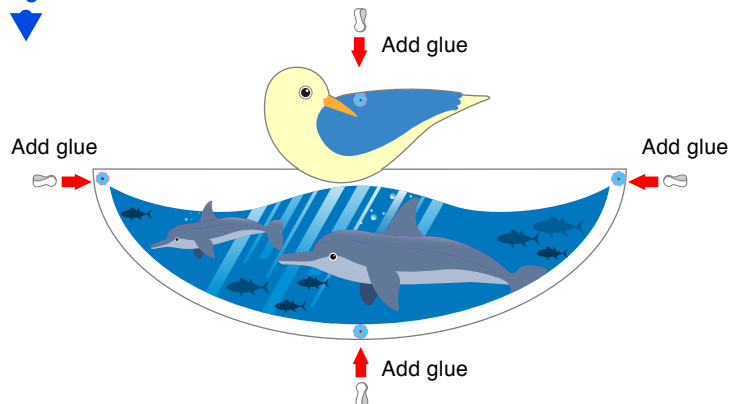


Cut out the tab and the slot, and put glue on one side of the tab.

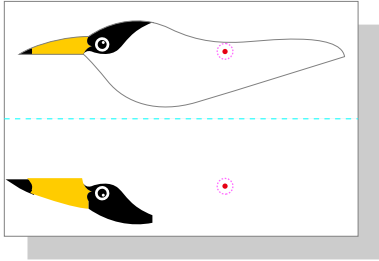
Caution! Make sure that the awake water bird sits on the bright water, and the sleeping water bird sits on the dark water.



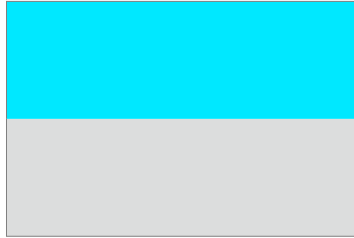
Open it up and put glue on the cyan area. Put in between two sheets of paper, pile something heavy such as books on top and leave to dry for a few hours. Then, cut out the part.



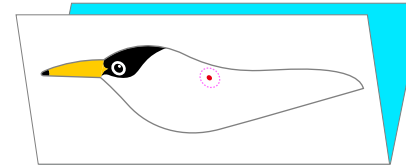
Fold about 50cm of string in half and align the ends, then make a knot about 1cm from the end. Thread the ends through the loop as shown by the arrow.



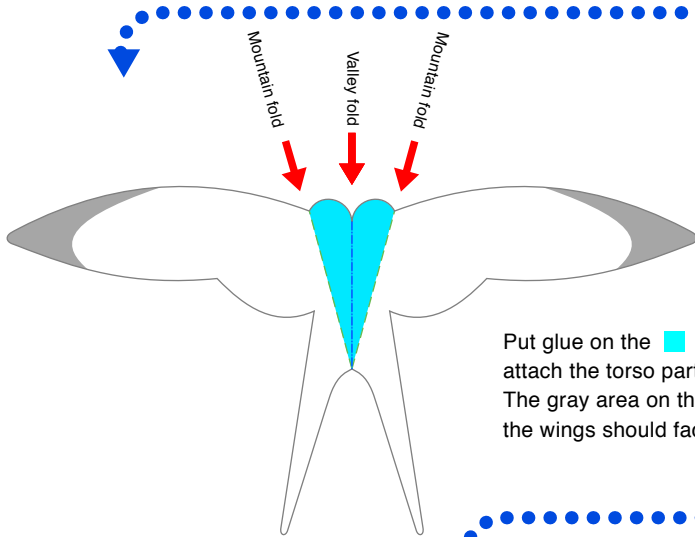
Cut along the square line around the edge of the torso parts, and make a mountain fold along the center line.



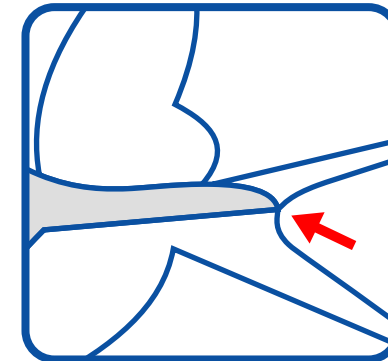
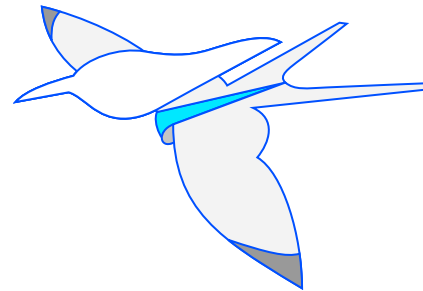
Turn over and glue.



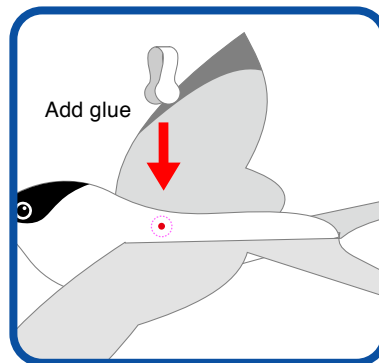
Put in between two sheets of paper, pile something heavy such as books on top and leave to dry for a few hours. Then, cut out the part.



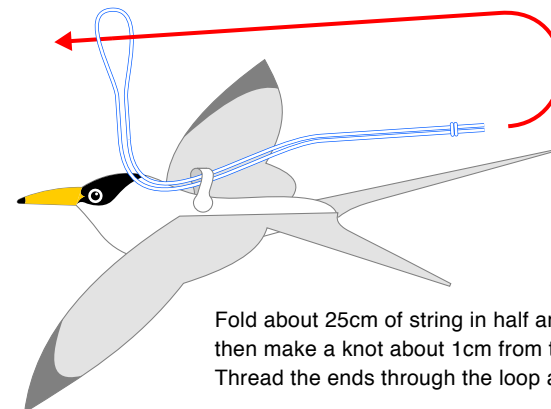
Put glue on the area and attach the torso parts. The gray area on the tips of the wings should face up.



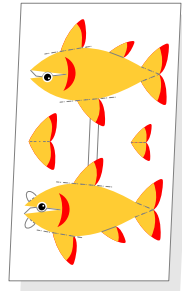
Make sure these parts fit together exactly.



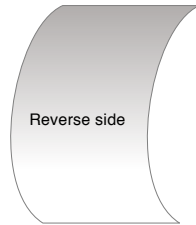
Add glue



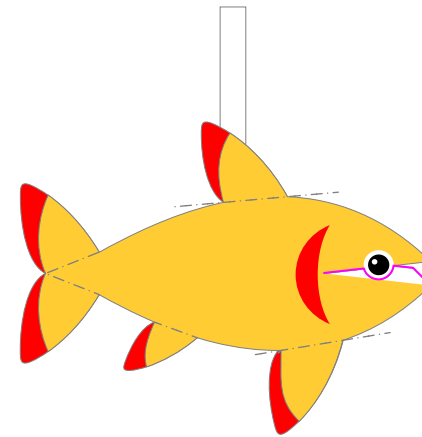
Fold about 25cm of string in half and align the ends, then make a knot about 1cm from the end. Thread the ends through the loop as shown by the arrow.



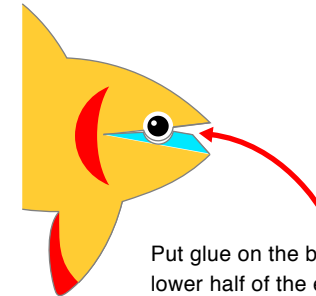
Cut out the parts roughly, and use a ruler and exhausted pen to score along the lines.



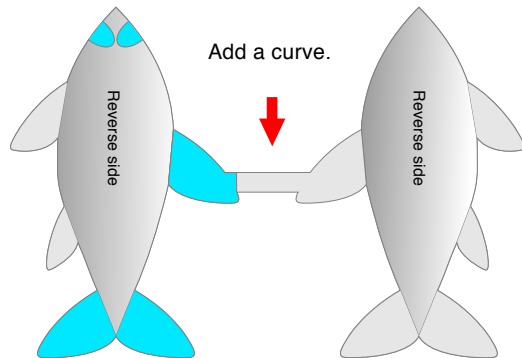
Turn over and curve.



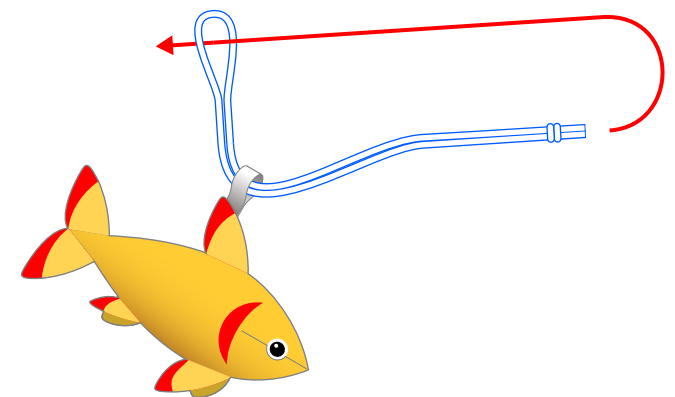
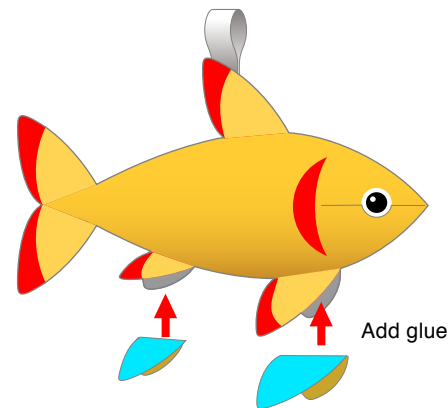
— Cut a slot.
- - - Make a valley fold.



Put glue on the back of the lower half of the eye too.



Put glue on the glue spots and fins indicated and attach the left and right sides together.



Fold about 40cm of string in half and align the ends, then make a knot about 1cm from the end. Thread the ends through the loop as shown by the arrow.

Connect the parts in the following order.

- ① Connect the sky arm and sea arm.
- ② Attach the bird ornaments to either side of the sky arm.
- ③ Attach the fish ornaments to the sea arm.
